Wasting the Nation: Making trash of people and places

Monday, 9 February 2009

On Tuesday 10th February groundWork [1] releases its 7th Annual review of the State of Environmental Justice in South Africa [2]. This review focuses on waste in South Africa at a time when President Kgalema Motlanthe is about to sign the National Environmental Management: Waste Bill into force.

The groundWork Report 2008 reviews the politics of waste in South Africa, and how capital has shaped the creation of waste and how it determines its destruction, along with the destruction and wasting of peoples' lives.

The report reviews the failure of the South African government to produce accurate and legitimate figures on the production of waste in South Africa, how the new waste legislation is a process of deferred action rather than clear guidance and regulations that are needed urgently now, the creation of and toxification of waste, the municipal waste stream and the struggles of poor people whose livelihoods depend on reclaiming waste from landfill sites. Finally, it looks at how the present system of capital accumulation and over consumption results in undemocratic practices, the continual creation of a disposal society, thereby further impoverishing the poor, and calls upon unions and social movements to unite to ensure that production is challenged and democratised to occur without waste.

Annie Leonard [3], an expert on international sustainability and environmental health and author of 'Stuff' [4] says:

Waste is not an isolated technical problem but is a symptom, a physical manifestation, of much deeper problems with the current economic, political and social systems. Waste is the visible face of a development model built on the assumption that some people matter more than others, that pollution is the inevitable price of progress and blind economic growth is the highest possible good.
